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Synod at a glance

The First Session of the 53rd Synod met in the Wesley Theatre, 220 Pitt Street Sydney, on 11, 12, 13, 18 and 19 September 2023.

The Synod made 65 resolutions, passed 8 ordinances and 1 policy, and filled 279 positions on boards, councils, and committees. This circular outlines the key features of the Synod’s proceedings with respect to **parishes**.

Mission Hour

Bishop Malcolm Richards led Mission Hour focusing on the Sydney Diocese’s partnerships with the Anglican Church in Madagascar, Malaysia, and the Democratic Republic of Congo. This included presentations from the Rev Berthier Lainirina from Madagascar from the Rev Wilston Trin from Malaysia. Synod's key decisions

The Synod welcomed the leadership of the Archbishop as expressed in the document [Purpose and Priorities for our Diocesan Fellowship](#). The document articulates the direction and focus for churches, schools, and organisations within the Diocese, and sets out nine priorities particularly thinking about the next five years.

The Synod received a presentation from Ms Larissa Minniecon, the Rev Neville Naden, and the Rev Michael Duckett on matters relating to **Indigenous reconciliation and the Voice Referendum**. By resolution 22/23, the Synod welcomed the Statement of the Sydney Anglican Indigenous Peoples' Ministry Committee about the Voice referendum. *[For the text of the Statement, refer to the attached list of Resolutions.]*

By resolution 23/23, the Synod approved the **Statement of Funding Principles and Priorities 2025-2027**, which was informed by the *Purpose and Priorities for our Diocesan Fellowship*. The Statement established general principles and specific funding principles that should guide the preparation of diocesan budgets.

The Synod adopted an [updated version of the Responding to Domestic Abuse: Policy and Good Practice Guidelines](#). The policy was first adopted in 2018, and at that time the Synod asked the Standing Committee to review the policy after four years' operation and report back in 2023. The updates reflect developments since 2018 and extensive consultation and research. By resolution 30/23, parishes are encouraged to familiarise themselves with the revised documents and implement them locally.

The Synod considered an [Exposure Draft of a revised Governance Policy for Diocesan Organisations](#), about which the Governance Policy Review Committee is seeking feedback. By resolution 33/23, among other things, the Synod affirmed the following in relation to parishes –

- (a) that churches, in pursuing their individual charitable purpose(s), are partners in our shared ministry, and part of a network collectively seeking to advance the broader charitable purposes of the Diocese while maintaining high standards of governance, and
- (b) the importance of churches pursuing their individual charitable purpose(s) in a manner which is consistent with the doctrines, tenets and beliefs of the Anglican Church in the Diocese of Sydney.

Regarding the Exposure Draft, the Synod also, among other things –

- (a) by resolution 34/23, endorsed the approach of creating a *tiered model of governance*,
- (b) by resolution 35/23, endorsed the approach of *requiring governors and leaders to be of Christian faith and character*, and
- (c) by resolution 50/23, encouraged the Committee to continue exploring the approach of *requiring governors and leaders to provide a signed Statement of Personal Commitment to Organisational Faithfulness*,

noting that feedback has been requested on each of these approaches.

The Synod considered its **partnership with Anglican Schools** in the mission and ministry of the Diocese. Among other things, the Synod requested further consultation be undertaken with appropriate people at Anglican Schools regarding a draft statement on Reformed Anglican Education and training opportunities for Anglican educators.

The Synod also considered two matters related to ministry wellbeing and development, in response to Synod resolution 54/22 and recommendation 16.5 of the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse. The Synod, among other things –

- (a) by resolution 32/23, requested the Standing Committee to implement arrangements for all ministry workers in the Diocese to undergo **regular performance appraisals** in light of feedback received about the proposed arrangements, and
- (b) by resolution 52/23, requested the Archbishop-in-Council to approve a Pastoral Supervision Policy to implement arrangements for **Pastoral Supervision for church workers** as contemplated in the *Pastoral Supervision Ordinance 2023*.

Actions for parishes and Synod members

The Synod passed a number of resolutions that included calls to action from parishes and Synod representatives. Each of these are provided in summary below for ease of reference; but should be read in the context of the complete resolution. The full terms of all of the resolutions passed by the Synod at its recent session are provided in the Attachment.

Consumption of alcohol in the parish context: By resolution 2/23, among other things, the Synod encouraged wardens to implement a parish policy on alcohol, or review their existing policy, in light of the report [Consumption of Alcohol in the Context of Parishes, Churches, Congregations and Fellowships in the Anglican Diocese of Sydney](#) updated in 2023, and the [Policy on Consumption of Alcohol in the Parish Context](#) adopted by the Synod in 2009.

World Mental Health Day – 10 October 2023: By resolution 7/23, among other things, the Synod encouraged parishes to raise awareness of the prevalence of mental health issues in our churches and communities, and of available resources and support, by promoting, participating in and praying for World Mental Health Day (October 10). Anglicare's Disaster Recovery: By resolution 16/23, among other things, the Synod encouraged parishioners to consider becoming Disaster Recovery volunteers with Anglicare Sydney, given the concerns being expressed at the expected scale and severity of the imminent bushfire season. Christian Preschools: By resolution 19/23, among other things, the Synod encouraged all Preschools and Long Day Care centres over which our parishes have influence to have a Christ-centred constitution, a Christian Director, and a Christ-centred curriculum.

Purpose and priorities for our Diocesan Fellowship: By resolution 20/23, among other things, the Synod called on all churches prayerfully to consider how they can contribute to the purpose and priorities the Archbishop has articulated in the [Purpose and Priorities for our Diocesan Fellowship](#). [*See also Synod's key decisions, page 2.*]

South Western Region buildings and property strategy: By resolution 24/23, among other things, the Synod invited feedback from members of the Synod on the [draft South Western Region Buildings and Property Strategy](#). (Feedback to diocesan.secretary@sydney.anglican.asn.au by 30 November 2023.)

Online Sports Betting – Federal Harm Reduction: By resolution 25/23, among other things, the Synod encouraged all members of Synod to write to their local Federal Members of Parliament urging them to support and implement all the recommendations of the ‘You win some, you lose more: Inquiry into online gambling and its impacts on those experiencing gambling harm’ report.

NSW Poker Machine Use – State Harm Reduction: By resolution 26/23, among other things, the Synod encouraged all members of Synod to write to their local Members of the Parliament of NSW urging them to work diligently towards reducing the misery caused by poker machine gambling.

Hungry or Homeless – Tough Choices in a Cost-Of-Living Crisis: By resolution 27/23, among other things, the Synod encouraged local church ministers and members to contact their federal and state MPs urging prompt practical action towards the improvement of our social welfare safety net and increased supply of affordable and public housing.

Prayer for the Brisbane 2024 Gafcon Australasia Conference: By resolution 29/23, among other things, the Synod gave thanks to God for his work in and through the Gafcon movement to promote the gospel, uphold mission, and welcome orthodox Anglicans whoever and wherever they are. The Synod encouraged each parish to send delegates to the next Gafcon Australasia conference in Brisbane in July 2024.

Implementation of the Domestic Abuse Policy: By resolution 30/23, among other things, the Synod respectfully encouraged parish councils to –

- (a) familiarise themselves with the newly revised [‘Responding to Domestic Abuse: Policy and Good Practice Guidelines’ \(with appendices\)](#),
- (b) adopt the revised [model parish domestic abuse policy](#) (Appendix 7),
- (c) display and otherwise utilise resources such as –
 - (i) posters from the Office of the Director of Safe Ministry (ODSM),
 - (ii) the Policy’s flow chart and table of contacts,
 - (iii) ‘The Use and Misuse of Scripture with Regard to Domestic Abuse’ (Appendix 2), and
 - (iv) other language resources of the same, where available from the ODSM,
- (d) make links to local domestic violence services,
- (e) appoint a domestic abuse contact person within the parish, and
- (f) request their rector to –
 - (i) teach clearly and periodically in this area in line with the policy,
 - (ii) ensure training for parish clergy and church workers in the area of domestic abuse response is ongoing and refreshed,
 - (iii) consider primary prevention programs such as ‘Before It Starts’ for youth groups,
 - (iv) review the approach used by parish clergy to marriage preparation and enrichment for sensitivity to domestic abuse dynamics (noting Appendix 9), and
 - (v) consider training in the dynamics of trauma, with resources from Anglican Diaconess Ministries’ Mental Health & Pastoral Care Institute providing a possible starting point.

Performance Appraisals of Ministry Workers: By resolution 32/23, among other things, the Synod invited members of the Synod to provide feedback on the proposed arrangements for all ministry workers in the Diocese to undergo regular performance appraisals as contemplated in the report [Performance Appraisals of Ministry Workers](#) (Feedback to diocesan.secretary@sydney.anglican.asn.au by 31 December 2023.) Review of the Governance Policy for Diocesan Organisations: By resolution 33/23, among other things, the Synod requested Synod members and churches to review the [Exposure Draft of the revised Governance Policy for Diocesan Organisations](#). (Feedback to diocesan.secretary@sydney.anglican.asn.au by 31 December 2023.) [See also Synod's key decisions, page 2.]

Encouragement to speak of the Christian hope: By resolution 36/23, among other things, the Synod encouraged –

- (a) Christians to speak of the hope that can be found in Jesus for all people, including any who are considering ending their life or the life of the unborn (2 Cor 4:13), and the life of faith and love that can be found following Jesus (Col 1:5),
- (b) local church leaders to consider how they can equip their members for this task, and
- (c) pastors, youth group leaders, chaplains and other faith leaders to commend that this priority of cherishing life flows out of the fullness of God's salvation story in creation, fall, redemption, and glorification.

Persecution of Christians in Manipur: By resolution 39/23, among other things, the Synod requested parishes to pray for the protection of our Christian brothers and sisters in Manipur and encouraged churches to support through Anglican Aid's tax-deductible 'Aid for Manipur' fund (Further information is available at <https://anglicanaid.org.au/projects/aid-for-manipur/>.)

Sports Chaplaincy: By resolution 44/23, among other things, the Synod asked ministers to prayerfully consider how to support the work of Sports Chaplaincy Australia through promotion in our local churches and encouraging those already involved in sport to consider training as chaplains.

Assistant Director of Evangelism and New Churches: By resolution 46/23, among other things, the Synod noted the appointment of Mr David Jensen as Assistant Director of Evangelism and New Churches, and encouraged parishes to pray for, and work with, him to sharpen their evangelistic effectiveness for the salvation of many to the glory of God.

Support for Anglican Defence Chaplaincy: By resolution 47/23, among other things, the Synod commended the annual observance of Defence Sunday (the Sunday preceding Remembrance Day) to parishes. (Further information is available at <https://defenceanglicans.org.au/>.)

Foster Carer and Kinship Week: By resolution 51/23, among other things, the Synod exhorted rectors to –

- (a) inform their parishioners about the current need for foster carers,
- (b) ask their parishioners to consider prayerfully whether foster care might be a way that they are called to fulfill the biblical injunction to care for children in need (cf. James 1:27),
- (c) connect their parishioners to Anglicare's excellent foster care information and resources,
- (d) encourage all parishioners to pray for, and to support practically, other Christians who serve as foster carers, and

- (e) consider making ‘Foster Carer and Kinship Week’ each September something that their parish notes, celebrates, and prays for.

Conversion Practices Legislation: By resolution 65/23, among other things, the Synod encouraged Sydney Anglicans to meet with, or write to, their local Members of the Parliament of NSW to express their concerns and requests regarding proposed conversion practices legislation in NSW. Matters for prayer and consideration in parishes

Following are further resolutions calling for prayer.

8/23 Youthworks’ ministries

Synod, noting that almost 80% of church-goers say that they made decisions to follow Christ before their nineteenth birthday and 56% say they had a formative spiritual experience on a Christian camp, **thanks God** for the ministries of Youthworks, particularly –

- (a) the Port Hacking conference centres that are undergoing significant improvements to their accommodation units to enable more people from more churches to have more time in temporary Christian community, and
- (b) the creation of a secure Salesforce portal to assist local church SRE coordinators in more easily administering their SRE teachers thereby freeing up more volunteer ministry time for face to face gospel ministry,

and **seeks God’s blessing** on these endeavours that more young people in our city and beyond might question, explore and discover life-giving faith in Jesus Christ.

11/23 Commencement of voluntary assisted dying in NSW

Synod, noting the report ‘The commencement of voluntary assisted dying in NSW’ –

- (a) **gives praise and thanks to God** for his continued goodness in the provision of care and support to older persons living in residential aged care homes by Anglican Community Services (Anglicare Sydney),
- (b) thanks the members of the Archbishop’s Working Group on Voluntary Assisted Dying and recommends the Working Group’s Report to all who consider the passage of the Voluntary Assisted Dying Act 2022 (NSW) (Act) to be a tragedy for our society and a profound challenge for the church,
- (c) commends the decision by Anglicare Sydney to continue providing aged care services whilst adopting an approach that refuses to actively support euthanasia but complies with the Act, regulations and guidelines as far as a biblically informed Christian conscience will allow,
- (d) **prays** for the care and protection of all residents, their families and friends, and the staff, executives, and Board of Anglicare Sydney, as access to voluntary assisted dying becomes available on 28 November 2023 and beyond,

- (e) reaffirms its opposition to voluntary assisted dying and calls on the NSW Parliament to repeal the Act, and failing that to administer the Act in such a manner as to permit faith-based organisations, including residential aged care providers, who oppose euthanasia on the grounds of institutional conscientious objection, not to participate in, facilitate or permit voluntary assisted dying in or at their premises, facilities or services in any way,
- (f) affirms its commitment to supporting Anglicare Sydney as, confident in the goodness of God and the goodness of his word, it continues to work out the contours of faithfulness to Christ in humble obedience to the teaching of Scripture, even when faithfulness to this teaching is opposed by our governments, other institutions or prevailing popular opinions, and
- (g) resolves to stand with Anglicare if, like many faithful saints who have gone before us and many others around us, it is required to make costly decisions in order to maintain faithfulness to Christ.

38/23 The Kigali Commitment – Gafcon IV 2023 Global Conference

Synod, noting the Kigali Statement from the gathering at Gafcon IV 2023 –

- (a) **gives thanks** for –
 - (i) the Gafcon movement which guards and proclaims the unchanging Biblical truth in a changing world,
 - (ii) God’s grace in gathering together over 1,300 faithful Anglicans (including 315 bishops, 456 other clergy and 531 laity) from around the world at the Global Anglican Future Conference in Kigali, Rwanda in April 2023,
 - (iii) the generous hospitality of Archbishop Laurent Mbanda, his family, and the Anglican Church of Rwanda,
 - (iv) the faithful commitment of The Rev Canon Daniel Willis as Gafcon Director and Mr Paul Mirrington as Conference Director with their teams and volunteers in organising the conference,
- (b) receives ‘[The Kigali Commitment](#)’ with thanksgiving, and encourages Sydney Anglicans to read it for **encouragement and prayer**,
- (c) rejoices in the generous provision, through the Work Outside the Diocese Committee, of 48 bursaries, allowing delegates from 9 under-resourced partner countries to attend Gafcon IV, and
- (d) **undertakes to pray** for Gafcon to remain a Bible-based, orthodox Anglican, and gospel mission focused global movement under the direction of His Spirit for the honour of our Lord Jesus.

45/23 Anglicare Northern Inland

Synod –

- (a) **gives thanks** for vibrant work of Anglicare in the Diocese of Armidale,
...
- (f) commits to **pray** for the ongoing growth in the partnership between Anglicare Northern Inland and the parishes of the Diocese of Armidale, that together their love and concern for the local communities might adorn the gospel and open doors into unreached communities and areas of need, so together they might share the love of Jesus in word and deed.

64/23 Attendance Patterns and Mission in the Diocese

Synod –

- (a) **gives thanks to the Lord** for –
- (i) the faithful Anglican ministry efforts of both laity and clergy since 1788,
 - (ii) the crucial work of Moore Theological College, Anglicare, Youthworks, diocesan schools and other ministry organisations, in supporting the ministry of the Diocese’s churches,
 - (iii) the visionary and theological leadership of archbishops, past and present, and
 - (iv) the property and financial resources which facilitate the ministry of the Word,
- which have all contributed to almost 40% of the national Anglican Church's weekly attendance being within the geographical boundaries of the Diocese of Sydney,
- (b) therefore encourages all Sydney Anglicans to **pray** for the lost, so that the Lord would open their eyes and turn them from darkness to light, and from the power of Satan to God, so that they may receive forgiveness of sins and a place among those who are sanctified by faith in Christ (Acts 26:18)
- ...

Ordinances and policies

The Synod passed eight (8) ordinances and one (1) policy. Following are brief notes on each of them.

The **General Synod – Safe Ministry Legislation Amendments Canon 2022 Adopting Ordinance 2023** adopted the *Safe Ministry Legislation Amendments Canon 2022* to, among other things, amend seven principal canons for the purpose of implementing certain recommendations of the Royal Commission into Institutional Response to Child Sexual Abuse and to make other technical amendments.

The **General Synod – Constitution Amendment (Mandatory Suspension) Canon 2022 Assenting Ordinance 2023** assented to the *Constitution Amendment (Mandatory Suspension) Canon 2022*, to implement recommendation 16.52 of the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse relating to the mandatory suspension of persons in ministry who are subject to a plausible complaint of child sexual abuse.

The **General Synod – Constitution Amendment (Mandatory Deposition) Canon 2022 Assenting Ordinance 2023** assented to the *Constitution Amendment (Mandatory Deposition) Canon 2022* to implement recommendation 16.56 of the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse relating to the mandatory deposition of persons in religious ministry who are convicted of an offence relating to child sexual abuse.

The **Synod Standing Orders Ordinance 2019 Amendment Ordinance 2023** amended the *Synod Standing Orders Ordinance 2019* to clarify the effect of a procedural motion to end debate on a motion with respect to amendments for which notice has been given but have not been moved, and amend the timeframe for questions to be submitted to the Secretary in order to be tabled on the first day of a session of Synod.

The **Ministry Standards Ordinance 2017 Amendment Ordinance 2023** amended the *Ministry Standards Ordinance 2017 (MSO)* to, among other things, implement the following recommendations of the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse –

- (a) recommendation 16.52 relating to the mandatory suspension of persons in ministry if they have been convicted of offences related to child sexual abuse, or are the subject of allegations of child sexual abuse and at risk of having contact with children in the exercise of functions, and
- (b) recommendation 16.56 relating to the mandatory deposition of persons in religious ministry if they have convictions related to child sexual abuse that were committed while an adult.

The **Synod Appropriations and Allocations Ordinance 2023** appropriates and allocates funds for 2024 in a manner that is consistent with the Synod's intention as reflected in the Statement of Funding Principles and Priorities 2019-2021, and is broadly similar to the actual appropriations and allocations made for 2023, with the exception of funding for three new initiatives which are consistent with the Statement of Funding Principles and Priorities 2025-2027.

The **Parochial Cost Recoveries Ordinance 2023** provides for the charges to be recovered from and levied on parishes in 2024 in a manner that is broadly similar to the actual charges and levies payable in 2023.

Synod adopted the revised and updated ***Responding to Domestic Abuse: Policy and Good Practice Guidelines*** as a policy of the Synod, having been reviewed after four years' operation. *[See also Synod's Key Decisions, page 2.]*

The ***Pastoral Supervision Ordinance 2023*** provides for a mandatory system of Pastoral Supervision, in response to Synod resolution 54/22 and recommendations 16.5b and 16.45 of the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse. *[See also Synod's Key Decisions, page 2.]*

Resolutions of 2023 Synod

1/23 Amendments to Faithfulness in Service

Synod, noting the report 'Amendments to Faithfulness in Service: A national code for personal behaviour and the practice of pastoral ministry by clergy and church workers', adopts the amendments to Faithfulness in Service as set out in the report.

(Mrs Briony Bounds 11/09/2023)

2/23 Consumption of alcohol in the parish context

Synod, noting the report 'Consumption of alcohol in the parish context: update to the 2009 report' and the associated updated report on 'Consumption of Alcohol in the Context of Parishes, Churches, Congregations and Fellowships in the Anglican Church Diocese of Sydney' (the updated Report) –

- (a) requests that a copy of the updated Report be sent to all parish ministers and wardens,
- (b) requests that all parish ministers and wardens be reminded of the 'Policy on Consumption of Alcohol in the Parish Context' adopted by Synod in 2009,
- (c) encourages all wardens to implement a parish policy on alcohol, or review their existing policy, in the light of the updated Report and existing Synod policy, and
- (d) requests the General Synod to consider the impact of social media on parishioners, especially the vulnerable, and educate clergy on faithful usage of these media. This may include instruction on any potential harm of posting photographs of leaders consuming alcohol.

3/23 Response to Newmarch House 2020 COVID-19 Outbreak

Synod, noting that it resolved in 2022 that when all inquiries and legal matters are resolved, and the matter was no longer sub judice, Anglicare Sydney prepare a report on the steps and actions that have been taken to address the specific and broader issues and challenges revealed by the COVID-19 outbreak at Newmarch House in 2020 –

- (a) notes that the Newmarch House 2020 COVID-19 outbreak remains *sub judice* as –
 - (i) the Report of the coronial inquest into the Newmarch House 2020 COVID-19 outbreak has not yet been released, and
 - (ii) a class action has been filed in relation to the outbreak, and
- (b) requests that, when all inquiries and legal matters are resolved, the Board and executive team of Anglicare Sydney prepare a report to the Standing Committee on the steps and actions that have been taken to address the specific and broader issues and challenges revealed by the COVID-19 outbreak at Newmarch House in 2020.

4/23 Diocesan Doctrine Commission's terms of reference

Synod, noting the report 'The Diocesan Doctrine Commission's terms of reference', requests that the Commission appointed by the Archbishop in consultation with the Standing Committee pursuant to resolution 19/81 –

- (a) be comprised of ten persons, to serve for a term of three years,
- (b) have a Chair, appointed by the Archbishop from among the members, and
- (c) consider and report on issues which may be referred to it from time to time only by the Synod, the Standing Committee, or by the Archbishop,

and encourages the Standing Committee to approve suitable Terms of Reference for the Commission that reflect the recommendations of this motion.

6/23 50th Anniversary of Robert Menzies College

Synod notes that 2023 marks the 50th anniversary of the founding of Robert Menzies College and gives thanks to God for the caring community, and Christian teaching and equipping it has provided to thousands of university students for over half a century.

Synod values the important contribution the College makes to university life in our city and recognises the many faithful people who have been involved in the ministry of the College since its conception. Synod encourages the Master and all those involved today to faithfully continue this heritage for the glory of God.

7/23 World Mental Health Day – 10 October 2023

Synod, noting that over two in five Australians aged 16-85 years (43.7% or 8.6 million people) are estimated to have experienced a mental disorder at some time in their life, encourages our parishes to raise awareness of the prevalence of mental health issues in our churches and communities, and of available resources and support, by promoting, participating in and praying for World Mental Health Day (October 10), including by using the resources from The Mental Health and Pastoral Care Institute (<https://mentalhealthinstitute.org.au/for-churches/world-mental-health-day/>).

8/23 Youthworks' ministries

Synod, noting that almost 80% of church-goers say that they made decisions to follow Christ before their nineteenth birthday and 56% say they had a formative spiritual experience on a Christian camp, thanks God for the ministries of Youthworks, particularly –

- (a) the Port Hacking conference centres that are undergoing significant improvements to their accommodation units to enable more people from more churches to have more time in temporary Christian community, and
- (b) the creation of a secure Salesforce portal to assist local church SRE coordinators in more easily administering their SRE teachers thereby freeing up more volunteer ministry time for face to face gospel ministry,

and seeks God's blessing on these endeavours that more young people in our city and beyond might question, explore and discover life-giving faith in Jesus Christ.

9/23 Ministry Standards Ordinance 2017

Synod, noting that the *Ministry Standards Ordinance 2017 (MSO)* has been in operation for five years, asks Standing Committee to investigate –

- (a) the impact of the complaints processes of the Office of the Director of Safe Ministry (**ODSM**) under the MSO on church workers, their families, and their parish ministry, including duration of complaints handling, impact of confidentiality requirements, perceptions of the investigation process, and general confidence in the process,

- (b) the adequacy of support arrangements for complainants and respondents involved in ODSM processes,
 - (c) the cost of processing complaints that ultimately do not proceed, or return no finding of unfitness, and how those costs can be minimised,
 - (d) what steps can be taken to minimise negative impacts on church workers and their families that result from false, trivial or vexatious complaints,
 - (e) whether the shift to a fitness for office test has achieved the intended objectives, what costs it has involved, and whether it should be maintained,
 - (f) whether complaints of child sexual abuse and bullying are best governed by a common process and/or ordinance, or whether these complaints require different approaches, processes and/or ordinances,
 - (g) the extent to which the biblical necessity for church discipline and the practical requirements of such church discipline are properly considered in our approach to, and definitions of, bullying and harassment, and
 - (h) how we can make better use of the Diocesan policy for dealing with allegations of unacceptable behaviour and other processes in resolving conflict apart from the MSO,
- and report its findings and recommendations to the 2024 session of Synod.

10/23 Leadership of Indigenous Ministry in the Diocese

Synod, noting the report 'Leadership of Indigenous Ministry in the Diocese' –

- (a) expresses its gratitude for the work of the volunteers who serve on the Sydney Anglican Indigenous Peoples' Ministry Committee (SAIPMC),
- (b) notes the report from the SAIPMC that Indigenous ministry in the Diocese is hampered because a committee of volunteers is not able to lead and drive the vision for Indigenous ministry (and true gospel reconciliation) across our Diocese and beyond,
- (c) expresses in-principle support for the recommendation of SAIPMC for the recognition and appointment of an Indigenous person (or persons) to lead and represent Indigenous ministry in our Diocese,
- (d) requests the Standing Committee to appoint a committee to explore how best to implement the recommendation of SAIPMC. The committee should consider –
 - (i) the scope of the role,
 - (ii) whether this role should be full time or part time, and/or a possible staged implementation,
 - (iii) whether there should be Indigenous representation on the Standing Committee,
 - (iv) the appropriate form of appointment (e.g., Canon, Archdeacon or Bishop), and
 - (v) the funding of this role, and
- (e) requests, to the extent that the recommendations of the committee require ordinance changes, that such changes be brought to the next session of the Synod for consideration.

11/23 Commencement of voluntary assisted dying in NSW

Synod, noting the report 'The commencement of voluntary assisted dying in NSW' –

- (a) gives praise and thanks to God for his continued goodness in the provision of care and support to older persons living in residential aged care homes by Anglican Community Services (Anglicare Sydney),
- (b) thanks the members of the Archbishop's Working Group on Voluntary Assisted Dying and recommends the Working Group's Report to all who consider the passage of the Voluntary Assisted Dying Act 2022 (NSW) (Act) to be a tragedy for our society and a profound challenge for the church,
- (c) commends the decision by Anglicare Sydney to continue providing aged care services whilst adopting an approach that refuses to actively support euthanasia but complies with the Act, regulations and guidelines as far as a biblically informed Christian conscience will allow,

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- (d) prays for the care and protection of all residents, their families and friends, and the staff, executives, and Board of Anglicare Sydney, as access to voluntary assisted dying becomes available on 28 November 2023 and beyond,
- (e) reaffirms its opposition to voluntary assisted dying and calls on the NSW Parliament to repeal the Act, and failing that to administer the Act in such a manner as to permit faith-based organisations, including residential aged care providers, who oppose euthanasia on the grounds of institutional conscientious objection, not to participate in, facilitate or permit voluntary assisted dying in or at their premises, facilities or services in any way,
- (f) affirms its commitment to supporting Anglicare Sydney as, confident in the goodness of God and the goodness of his word, it continues to work out the contours of faithfulness to Christ in humble obedience to the teaching of Scripture, even when faithfulness to this teaching is opposed by our governments, other institutions or prevailing popular opinions, and
- (g) resolves to stand with Anglicare if, like many faithful saints who have gone before us and many others around us, it is required to make costly decisions in order to maintain faithfulness to Christ.

13/23 New Diocesan Bishops

Synod –

- (a) notes that, since it last met –
 - (i) the Ven Darrell Parker was consecrated at St Andrew's Cathedral on 3 February 2023 and installed as the eighth Bishop of North West Australia at Holy Cross Cathedral in Geraldton on Wednesday 15 February 2023,
 - (ii) the Right Rev Jeremy James was installed in the Cathedral of St Peter and St Paul, Port Pirie as the eighth Bishop of Willochra on 25 February 2023, and
 - (iii) the Right Rev Jeremy Greaves was elected on 26 August 2023 as the tenth Archbishop of Brisbane and Metropolitan of the Province of Queensland, and will be installed on 16 December 2023 at St John's Cathedral, and
- (b) assures these bishops of our prayers and good wishes in their episcopal roles, praying –

Lord, bless your servants Darrell, Jeremy and Jeremy called to the work and ministry of a bishop. So fill them with the truth of your doctrine and clothe them with holiness of life, that they may faithfully minister in this office to the glory of your name and the benefit of your Church. We ask this through our Lord Jesus Christ, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

14/23 Ordination Policy

Synod, noting that the current Ordination Policy was last updated in 2019, and that the world and ministry environment has changed significantly since, recommends that the Archbishop review and update the Ordination Policy with a view to increasing the quality and quantity of Gospel workers across the Diocese.

15/23 Funding for Work Outside the Diocese

Synod notes that –

- (a) the Work Outside the Diocese allocation for 2024 in the *Synod Appropriation and Allocations Ordinance 2023* is based on 4.5% of the total income available to Synod,
 - (b) this is despite a 22% increase in available income compared to 2023,
 - (c) past Synods have requested 5% of the available income to be applied for this purpose, and
 - (d) the relevant report states that the percentage reduction is temporary,
- and therefore requests Standing Committee to work towards appropriation bills that return to the policy of applying 5% of available income for Work Outside the Diocese in future years.

16/23 Anglicare's Disaster Recovery

Synod notes that –

- (a) 2023 marks 25 years of the Disaster Recovery ministry in NSW led by Anglicare Sydney,
- (b) the ministry was first established by the Province in 1998 as a response to the bushfires of 1994 and 1997, with the intention of providing an Anglican presence, support and relief to communities experiencing natural disasters,
- (c) over the 25 year of Disaster Recovery, Anglicare Sydney has been the authorised agent of the Province to represent all the Dioceses in NSW, coordinating a parish based volunteer response in partnership with other Anglicare agencies, and
- (d) Anglicare's Disaster Recovery volunteers are trained, registered and ready to go at a moment's notice to provide material aid and general support in evacuation and recovery centres, during natural and other significant disasters.

Synod thankfully acknowledges –

- (a) the significant role that parishes and more than 750 current trained volunteers have played in supporting communities in times of natural disasters, including fires, floods, storms and displacement of communities by war,
- (b) the ongoing importance of this ministry in building recovery resilience and connection, especially in times of loss, and grief and dislocation, and
- (c) the central role that Anglicare Sydney has played in coordinating and managing this ministry across the whole State.

Synod also encourages parishioners to consider becoming Disaster Recovery volunteers, given the concerns being expressed at the expected scale and severity of the imminent bushfire season, and its very real potential to again impact communities across NSW. - (b) notes that, in conformity with the Synod's Governance Policy, a number of diocesan organisations have sought and obtained amendments to their constituting ordinances which expressly permit them to pursue their specifically mandated purpose in a manner which also advances the broader charitable purposes of the Diocese,
- (c) regards such amendments as a tangible expression of commitment to working together as part of the broader diocesan network and encourages all diocesan organisations, to the extent they are legally able to do so, to consider seeking such amendments,
- (d) requires all Category Two and Category Three diocesan organisations (under the *Accounts, Audits and Annual Reports Ordinance 1995*), except for schools, to annually report to Synod a summary of the steps they have taken in pursuit of the broader charitable purposes of the Diocese, and
- (e) encourages all Diocesan schools (mentioned in Category Three of the *Accounts, Audits and Annual Reports Ordinance 1995*) to annually report to Synod a summary of the steps they have taken in pursuit of the broader charitable purposes of the Diocese.

22/23 SAIPMC Statement on the Voice Referendum

Synod welcomes the statement of the Sydney Anglican Indigenous Peoples' Ministry Committee about the Voice referendum, as follows –

'The Sydney Anglican Indigenous Peoples' Ministry Committee affirms that God's voice is sovereign over all peoples and lands, and notes –

- Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people have been denied a voice following European settlement in this land,
- that there are benefits and challenges for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people through a recognised Voice to the Australian parliament,
- the passing of Resolution 33/22 'First Nations Voice' by the Sydney Anglican Diocesan Synod, and

- the 'Statement on the Voice to Parliament' as affirmed by the General Synod Standing Committee of the Anglican Church of Australia.

We encourage all church members to prayerfully seek God's voice as they search his wisdom in considering a 'yes' vote for the approaching referendum.'

24/23 South Western Region buildings and property strategy

Synod, noting the report 'South Western Region buildings and property strategy' –

- notes that the members of Synod have been invited to provide feedback on the draft South Western Region Buildings and Property Strategy, and that they can send their feedback on the Strategy to the Diocesan Secretary (DiocesanSecretary@sydney.anglican.asn.au) by 30 November 2023,
- requests the Standing Committee to consider approving the South Western Region Buildings and Property Strategy, having taken into account the feedback from Synod members, and
- requests the Standing Committee to prepare the remaining four Regional strategies and an overarching Diocesan-wide property strategy in support of ministry and report back to the next session of the Synod.

25/23 Online Sports Betting – Federal Harm Reduction

Synod, noting that the Bible says, 'Whoever mocks the poor insults his Maker; he who is glad at calamity will not go unpunished.' (Proverbs 17:5) –

- thinks the Federal Government for the steps they have already taken to address the public health crisis that is caused by online sports betting; in particular that the Federal Government has –
 - introduced the 'You win some, you lose more' campaign which mandated clearer warnings about the harms of online sports betting,
 - mandated that advertising for online sports betting include contact details of support services that can assist individuals experiencing gambling harm, and
 - held a wide ranging Parliamentary inquiry titled 'You win some, you lose more: Inquiry into online gambling and its impacts on those experiencing gambling harm' producing unanimous bipartisan recommendations,
- calls on the Federal Parliament, in light of this above inquiry and report, to implement the full 31 recommendations of the committee; in particular, that –
 - the responsibility for online gambling harm reduction be held by a single Australian Government Minister (Recommendation 1),
 - the Australian Government prohibit all online gambling inducements and inducement advertising, without delay (Recommendation 16), and
 - the Australian Government implement a comprehensive ban on all forms of advertising for online gambling, with the phased implementation commencing as soon as possible (Recommendation 26),
- requests that the Diocesan Secretary communicate the contents of this resolution to the Prime Minister and the Leader of the Federal Opposition, along with the Minister for Communications, and the Minister for Social Services, and

- (d) encourages all members of Synod to write to their local Federal Members of Parliament urging them to support and implement all the recommendations of the 'You win some, you lose more: Inquiry into online gambling and its impacts on those experiencing gambling harm' report.

26/23 NSW Poker Machine Use – State Harm Reduction

Synod, noting that –

- (i) Almighty God calls on governing rulers to 'defend the weak and the fatherless; uphold the cause of the poor and the oppressed; (Psalm 82:3),
 - (ii) \$8 billion is lost annually through poker machines in NSW (i.e., approximately \$23 million every day), disproportionately from lower socioeconomic areas of NSW, where poker machines are often most concentrated, and
 - (iii) documents recently tabled in the NSW Parliament from a 2021 series of club inspections, as part of an Anti-Money Laundering Project run by NSW Liquor and Gaming and the NSW Crime Commission, revealed investigators suspected \$5.5 million was laundered through 178 venues, just in a seven week period, with ten venues accounting for more than 40% of that total, mainly located in south-west Sydney,
- (a) thanks the NSW State Government for the steps it has already taken to address the public health crisis that is caused by poker machine gambling in NSW; in particular that the NSW State Government has –
 - (i) shepherded legislation through the NSW Parliament to ban political donations from licensed clubs with poker machines,
 - (ii) instructed Liquor & Gaming NSW to enforce laws already in place to eliminate external gambling-related advertising, and
 - (iii) committed to a trial of a mandatory cashless gambling card system for poker machines in NSW, to be overseen by an independent advisory panel comprised of industry, harm minimisation, academic, cyber crime, police, and union representatives,
 - (b) calls on the NSW Government to implement this trial as swiftly as possible, within a framework of pre-implementation testing for a mandatory cashless gaming card, which public health, law enforcement and welfare policy experts have already recommended as a most effective harm minimisation method, both for problems caused by gambling and by money-laundering,
 - (c) supports urgent consideration by the NSW Government of the calls from NSW MPs –
 - (i) requesting a Royal Commission into the conduct, integrity and influence of the gambling industry in NSW, and
 - (ii) transferring regulation and oversight of 'casino-like' clubs operating more than 250 gaming machines from the Independent Liquor and Gaming Authority to the NSW Independent Casino Commission,
 - (d) requests that the Diocesan Secretary communicate the contents of this resolution to the Premier of NSW, the NSW Leader of the Opposition, and the Minister for Gaming and Racing, and
 - (e) encourages all members of Synod to write to their local Members of the Parliament of NSW urging them to work diligently towards reducing the misery caused by poker machine gambling.

27/23 Hungry or Homeless – Tough Choices in a Cost-Of-Living Crisis

Synod –

- (a) notes the excellent qualitative research report 'Hungry or Homeless – Tough Choices in a Cost-Of-Living Crisis' published in May 2023, that details the confronting strategies that low income households are utilising to cope with current high inflation environment, involving rising rental, interest rates, food and energy prices, such as going without food or heating or medical care so as to avoid eviction and the threat of homelessness,
- (b) acknowledges that too many are impoverished in our society and are unable easily to experience the contentment that Scripture both prays for and urges, when it says, 'Give me neither poverty nor riches, but give me only my daily bread' (Proverbs 30:8) and 'if we have food and clothing, we will be content with that' (1 Timothy 6:8),

- (c) is thankful for our churches' partnership with Anglicare in delivering emergency food and financial aid, financial counselling, access to case management and advocacy, since we remember that 'If anyone has material possessions and sees a brother or sister in need but has no pity on them, how can the love of God be in that person?' (1 John 3:17), and recommits our members to this partnership,
- (d) notes that report's conclusion that, 'A coordinated, multifaceted approach by all levels of government is required which targets the low level of JobSeeker and rapidly expands the supply of social and affordable housing. The levels of hardship being experienced by so many in our community, many of whom are children, need to be addressed if we are to ensure that people are not going hungry, can pay their bills and are not at risk of homelessness', and therefore
- (e) encourages local church ministers and members to contact their federal and state MPs urging prompt practical action in light of the above, towards the improvement of our social welfare safety net and increased supply of affordable and public housing.

- requests Standing Committee to consider whether the Ordinance should be amended, and if so, to bring any amendment to a forthcoming Synod.

This Synod –

- (b) recognises the importance of the next Gafcon Australasia conference in Brisbane next July and encourages each parish and diocesan organisation to send delegates,
- (c) delights in the choice of the Reverend Mike Dicker, Principal of Youthworks College, as the keynote Bible speaker, and encourages prayer for him and the conference that they may sit humbly under the word of God and grow in their confidence in the power, clarity and goodness of his word, and
- (d) commits to pray that this conference will strengthen faithful Anglican ministry throughout Australasia, so that the gospel will go forward, the church will be built and the Lord will be honoured.

30/23 Implementation of the Domestic Abuse Policy

Synod respectfully encourages parish councils to –

- (a) familiarise themselves with the newly revised Diocesan Domestic Abuse Policy,
- (b) adopt the revised model parish domestic abuse policy (Appendix 7),
- (c) display and otherwise utilise resources such as –
 - (i) posters from the Office of the Director of Safe Ministry (**ODSM**),
 - (ii) the Policy's flow chart and table of contacts,
 - (iii) 'The Use and Misuse of Scripture with Regard to Domestic Abuse' (Appendix 2), and
 - (iv) other language resources of the same, where available from the ODSM,
- (d) make links to local domestic violence services,
- (e) appoint a domestic abuse contact person within the parish, and
- (f) request their rector to –
 - (i) teach clearly and periodically in this area in line with the policy,

- (ii) ensure training for parish clergy and church workers in the area of domestic abuse response is ongoing and refreshed,
- (iii) consider primary prevention programs such as 'Before It Starts' for youth groups,
- (iv) review the approach used by parish clergy to marriage preparation and enrichment for sensitivity to domestic abuse dynamics (noting Appendix 9), and
- (v) consider training in the dynamics of trauma, with resources from Anglican Deaconess Ministries' Mental Health & Pastoral Care Institute providing a possible starting point.

- (b) requests the Standing Committee to implement arrangements for regular performance appraisals for all ministry workers in light of feedback received.

33/23 Review of the Governance Policy for Diocesan Organisations

Synod, noting the report 'Review of the Governance Policy for Diocesan Organisations' –

- (a) affirms that churches, schools and organisations to which the policy is proposed to apply, in pursuing their individual charitable purpose(s), are partners in our shared ministry, and part of a network collectively seeking to advance the broader charitable purposes of the Diocese while maintaining high standards of governance,
- (b) confirms the importance of churches, schools and organisations to which the policy is proposed to apply pursuing their individual charitable purpose(s) in a manner which is consistent with the doctrines, tenets and beliefs of the Anglican Church in the Diocese of Sydney,

- (d) requests that a further revised form of the Governance Policy be brought back to the Synod in 2024 incorporating, as appropriate, comments and feedback from Synod members, churches, schools and organisations to which the policy is proposed to apply.

 - (ii) the viability of Anglicare Northern Inland was significantly compromised due to the inability to undertake effective tendering, branding and marketing, and
 - (iii) Anglicare Northern Inland had 13 staff, 3 volunteers and insufficient funds to sustain its operations,
- (c) acknowledges the careful negotiations between Anglicare Sydney, Anglicare Northern Inland and the Diocese of Armidale that led to the merger of Anglicare Northern Inland and Anglicare Sydney in July 2018,
- (d) notes that in 2023 Anglicare Northern Inland –
- (i) has 40 staff and 20 volunteers,
 - (ii) has more than \$3.5million in funding, including government and donation income,
 - (iii) offers services in Mental Health, Aged Care, Counselling, Financial Counselling & Assistance, Community Pantries, Housing, Out of Home Care, Aboriginal Cultural Advisors and Trainees, Chaplaincy, Partnership Development with local churches and a revamped Disaster Recovery team, and
 - (iv) serves around 1,000 people in need each year across the Diocese of Armidale,
- (e) notes that –
- (i) since the merger the Diocese of Armidale and Anglicare have built a fresh, mutually beneficial relationship that has seen rapid growth in services and local parish/Anglicare partnerships,

- (ii) the relationship with the Diocese of Armidale is on a strong footing with both the former Bishop and the current Bishop Rod Chiswell, supportive of the work of Anglicare, and
- (f) commits to pray for the ongoing growth in the partnership between Anglicare Northern Inland and the parishes of the Diocese of Armidale, that together their love and concern for the local communities might adorn the gospel and open doors into unreached communities and areas of need, so together they might share the love of Jesus in word and deed.

- (b) exhorts all rectors to –
 - (i) inform their parishioners about the current need for foster carers,
 - (ii) ask their parishioners to consider prayerfully whether foster care might be a way that they are called to fulfill the biblical injunction to care for children in need (cf. James 1:27),
 - (iii) connect their parishioners to Anglicare's excellent foster care information and resources (available at: <https://www.anglicare.org.au/what-we-offer/foster-care-adoption/foster-care/> and <https://fostercare.anglicare.org.au>),
 - (iv) encourage all parishioners to pray for, and to support practically, other Christians who serve as foster carers, and
 - (v) consider making 'Foster Carer and Kinship Week' each September something that their parish notes, celebrates, and prays for.

52/23 Pastoral Supervision in the Diocese of Sydney

Synod, noting the report 'Pastoral Supervision in the Diocese of Sydney' –

- (a) affirms the importance of Pastoral Supervision, both as a measure to enhance the ministry wellbeing and development of church workers in the Diocese, and to implement a recommendation of the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse,
- (b) requests the Archbishop-in-Council to approve a Pastoral Supervision Policy as provided for by the *Pastoral Supervision Ordinance 2023*,
- (c) requests that the Pastoral Supervision Policy include a review date five years in the future, and
- (d) requests Standing Committee give consideration to facilitating professional research to evaluate the effect of the policy during the review period.

Synod also requests that –

- (i) consideration be given to exempting from the requirement for pastoral supervision new assistant ministers and other church workers undertaking the 3-year post-college Ministry Development program, given their program already involves guided reflection, mentoring, participation in 360-degree feedback and use of other psychometric tools,

- (ii) in the production of the Pastoral Supervision policy, consideration be given to including options for costless or low-cost forms of pastoral supervision, including but not limited to group pastoral supervision,
- (iii) alongside and in conjunction with the production of the Pastoral Supervision Policy, a holistic consideration of the whole suite of expectations on ministry workers' time (with regard to training, support and development) be conducted in order to determine if there are redundancies that can be eliminated to make up for the added time and potential cost of pastoral supervision, and
- (iv) the Pastoral Supervision Policy provide for the confidentiality of discussions between church workers and Pastoral Supervisors.

- (c) request the education advisor (or, in the absence of an education advisor, the Archbishop's delegate) to develop partnerships with university Christian fellowships in order to promote training opportunities and access to tertiary courses with cross-institutional credit which train teacher education students in distinctively Christian teaching,
- (d) request the education advisor (or, in the absence of an education advisor, the Archbishop's delegate) to report to the Standing Committee the findings at (b) for review and presentation to Synod, and
- (e) consider ways to fund such requests.

She was active in the governance of the Archbishop's Overseas Mission Fund and Anglican Deaconess Ministries. She also served as an Honorary Minister at South Coogee. Synod –

- (a) gives thanks to the Lord for –
 - (i) the faithful Anglican ministry efforts of both laity and clergy since 1788,
 - (ii) the crucial work of Moore Theological College, Anglicare, Youthworks, diocesan schools and other ministry organisations, in supporting the ministry of the Diocese’s churches,
 - (iii) the visionary and theological leadership of archbishops, past and present, and
 - (iv) the property and financial resources which facilitate the ministry of the Word, which have all contributed to almost 40% of the national Anglican Church’s weekly attendance being within the geographical boundaries of the Diocese of Sydney,
- (b) therefore encourages all Sydney Anglicans to pray for the lost, so that the Lord would open their eyes and turn them from darkness to light, and from the power of Satan to God, so that they may receive forgiveness of sins and a place among those who are sanctified by faith in Christ (Acts 26:18),
- (c) notes –
 - (i) the baby boomer generation, which constitutes a large percentage of the average attendance per week, has begun its progression to glory,
 - (ii) the population within the boundaries of the Diocese is booming and is projected to include an additional one million people by 2041,
 - (iii) the majority of that net population growth is expected to reside within the brownfield areas of Sydney, and
 - (iv) the challenges of ministering with ageing and often inadequate infrastructure within those brownfield areas,
- (d) further notes the external, forthcoming government-imposed challenges to overcome, that may adversely affect the impact of our ministries, and
- (e) requests the Standing Committee to initiate an analysis of average attendance trends, and an assessment of the likely impact of social changes upon average attendance, and report back to Synod in 2024.

65/23 Conversion Practices Legislation

Synod –

- (a) reaffirms Synod Resolution 31 of 2018, in particular that –
 - (i) ‘the Anglican Church in the Diocese of Sydney does not practise, recommend or endorse “gay conversion therapy”’, defined as psychological practices that ‘seek to re-orient sexual attraction to heterosexuality’, and that

- (ii) Synod 'values prayer for same-sex attracted Christians who wish to live celibate lives, noting that prayer is not a form of "gay conversion therapy"',
- (b) notes that the Conversion Practices Prohibition Bill 2023 (NSW), introduced by Mr Alex Greenwich, has been closely modelled on the *Victorian Change or Suppression (Conversion) Practices Prohibition Act 2021*, and adopts its expansive redefinition of Conversion Practices by including the broad and vague concept of suppression, according to which the following are illegal –
 - (i) a religious leader meeting one-on-one with a member of their congregation to encourage them not to act on same-sex attraction by practising celibacy,
 - (ii) religious teaching that someone is 'broken' because of their sexual orientation or gender identity,
 - (iii) the provision of support through group prayer to a young person to help them fight a desire to act on their feelings of same-sex attraction,
 - (iv) a religious leader telling a member of their congregation that they will be excommunicated if they continue their same-sex relationship,
 - (v) parents declining to support their child's request for puberty blockers if a health professional recommends it, or otherwise restricting their child access to any health care services that would affirm their child's gender identity, and
 - (vi) a teacher telling a student that God does not accept them unless they keep the sex they were assigned at birth and dress accordingly(All examples from <https://www.humanrights.vic.gov.au/change-or-suppression-practices/have-you-experienced-a-change-or-suppression-practice/>),
- (c) notes the pre-election commitments of the Premier and other members of the ALP that its legislation would prohibit 'dangerous and damaging' conversion practices, but that it would not ban a consenting individual seeking prayer or other advice and assistance, nor would it ban the expression of religious belief through religious teaching,
- (d) notes that the government's Consultation Paper on Banning Conversion Practices has proposed an approach that is very similar to the Victorian legislation and the Bill introduced by Mr Greenwich, which is inconsistent with the ALP's pre-election commitments,
- (e) calls on the Minns Labor Government to uphold its commitments regarding LGBTQ conversion therapy by introducing legislation that –
 - (i) bans dangerous and damaging practices that seek or promise to change sexual orientation, but does not use the broad and vague concept of 'suppression',
 - (ii) does not prohibit a consenting individual from seeking the support and assistance that they consider appropriate for themselves,
 - (iii) does not prohibit religious instruction and guidance that encourages church members to live in conformity with the ethical teaching of the Scriptures by not acting on desires that are contrary to this teaching,
 - (iv) does not expose parents to prosecution for failing to affirm and support their child's sexual orientation or gender identity, and
 - (v) does not introduce a bias towards gender-affirming treatment and the threat of prosecution for health professionals who recommend a different treatment approach, and
- (f) encourages Sydney Anglicans to meet with, or write to, their local MP to express their concerns and requests, and notes that Freedom for Faith has developed resources to assist in organising meetings and writing letters (<https://contactyourmp.org.au>).
